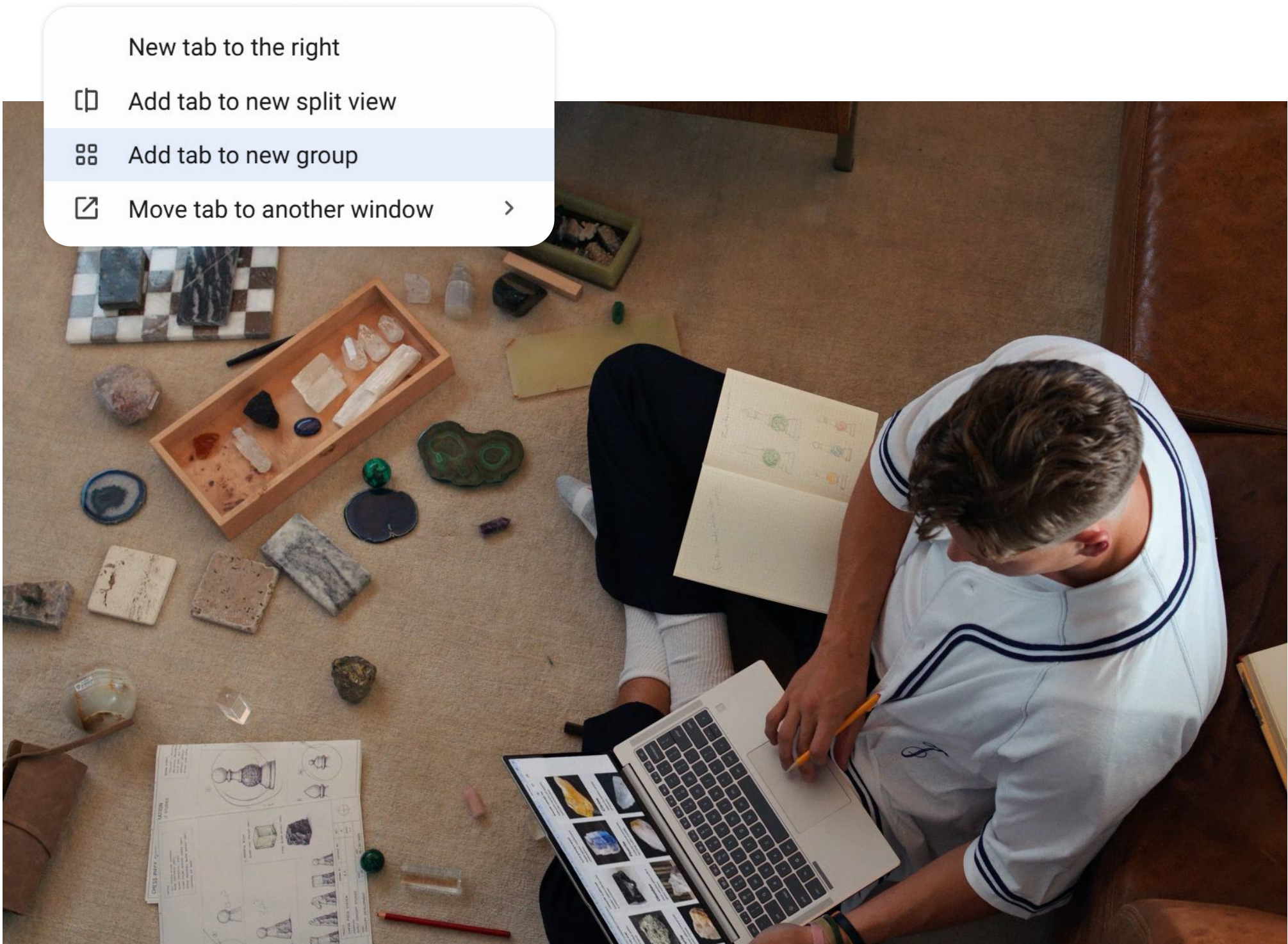


Joe Burrow

Tab Groups

In his research, Joe learned about the different types of crystals: what they look like, what they mean, and any properties that might help him develop his chess set. Joe used tab groups in Chrome during the course of his project as a way to organize his findings.

Select one or more tabs in your Chrome browser and right-click “Add tab to group” to either start a new group or move your tab(s) into an existing one.

You can change the color, name, and contents of your tab group at any time by right-clicking on the group. You can also close, delete, or ungroup tabs as needed.

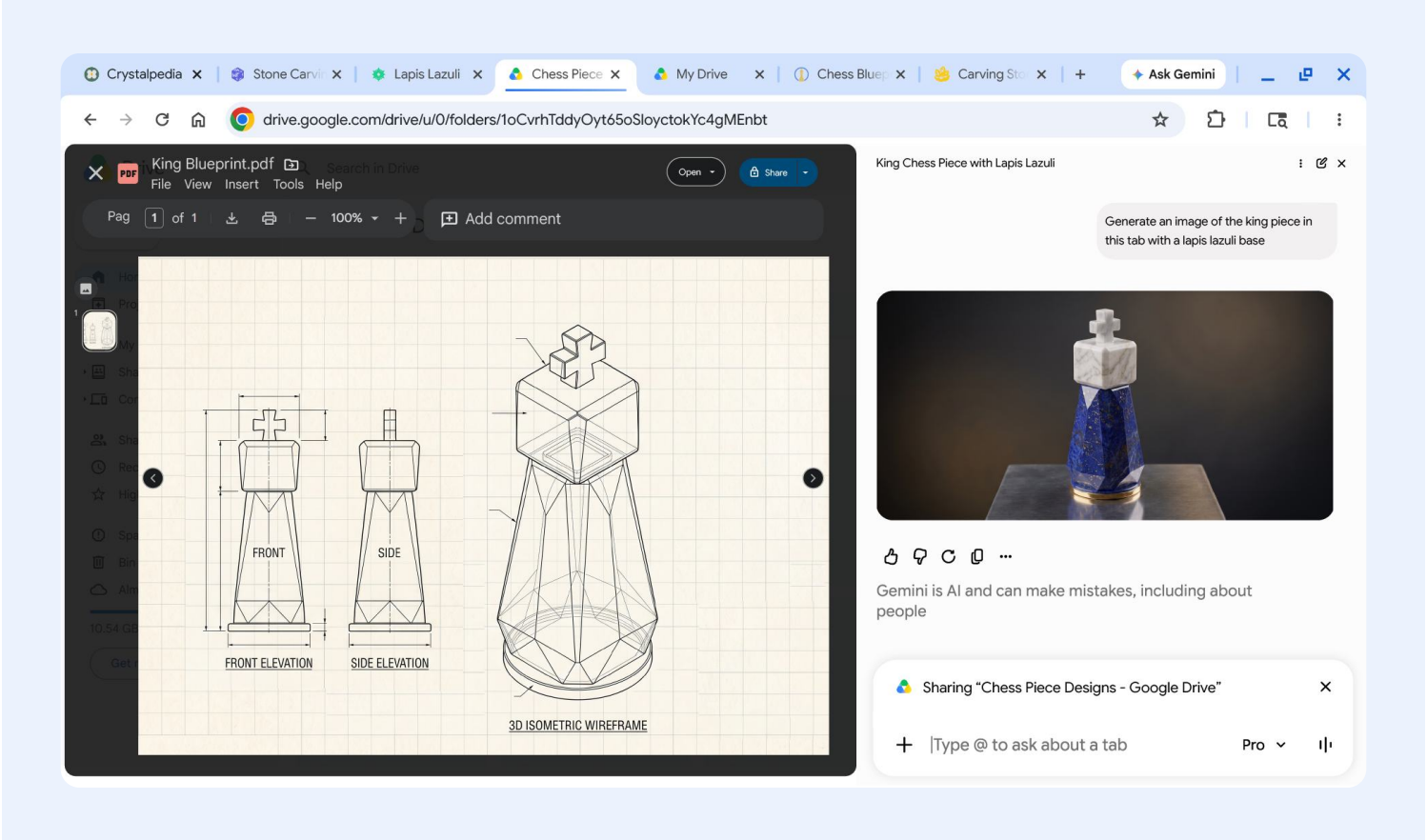
Diving Deeper with Gemini in Chrome

During his research, Joe used Gemini in Chrome to help him analyze his tabs to further understand the stones he wanted to use in his chess set. His prompts were key; here are some tips to help get the most out of your prompts.

Select one of the suggested prompts in the Gemini in Chrome sidebar to get the conversation started.

Get key takeaways, clarify concepts, and find answers based on the context of your open tabs.

Talk or type your question naturally, and Gemini in Chrome can use the page's context to help you quickly understand content or complete tedious tasks.



Visualize with Nano Banana and Gemini in Chrome

Make online inspiration your own creation. With Gemini in Chrome, you can transform an image you find on the web or visualize a webpage in an infographic. You can visualize almost anything just by asking.

You can take anything, like Joe's chess piece blueprints, and prompt Gemini in Chrome to help you see what different design options could look like. You can also take any inspiration you see on a webpage, and customize it with Gemini in Chrome. Using this helped Joe quickly decide on the creative direction for his chess pieces before starting to prototype.
